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Reminder of the Nature of CRWG's Work

- We were commissioned by Congress to:
 - Conduct a 3-Phase Consultation Process with all members (incl. Congress members)
 - Recommend a Constitution to Congress that the membership will approve
 - Conduct this
 - expeditiously
 - properly
 - based on best practice
 - Supported by legal advice

Draft Constitution for Discussion

The constitution that we present:

- Reflects and addresses Member's concerns
- Incorporates Principles, Features and Clauses based on Members Requirements
 - As expressed in 3 feedback rounds
- Underpinned by legal advice
- Will require 75% approval in a General Meeting

Unknowns:

- Form of Incorporation and Charitable status
 - · Assumed remains as is
 - Contingency clauses prepared if this changes

CRWG Modus Operandi

- Frequent Meetings (42 x 1hr over 16 months)
 - · Plus lots of home work
- Tasks:
 - Stimulation of participation by members
 - Assimilation of Participants' Input
 - Drafts, revisions and re-drafts
- · Our meetings included
 - Robust Discussion
 - · Strong Opinions, sometimes not aligned
 - Democratic Decision-Making
 - Mutual Respect, and no ad hominem attacks
- Supported by admirable admin
 - · Meeting notes within 24 hours
 - · Agenda with input for members and items carried forward
 - Agreed drafting completed within days



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The Primary Governance Elements Branches (8) Congress Congress Reps Electoral College (2-4)Votina Governing Monitoring of GC on Members Committee behalf of the members Meets c. Some significant changes in more detail

These affect:

- Governing Committee (renamed MC)
- Congress
- Effective Accountability

Clauses in green will be new to you Clauses in red are up for discussion

Governing Committee (cls. 11, 13)

- GC members:
 - Exercise the powers of the Society
 - Have full, joint-and-several responsibility
 - Are elected by Congress to 3-year terms
- Size of the Governing Committee 9-12
- Wide **Eligibility** Professional, Financial, 1 year's prior experience on an ACS Committee, with term limits
- Chair and 2 Vice-Chairs, elected from GC by GC but with no other ex officio roles such as Imm Past Pres
- Congress Chair participates in GC, but does not vote
- Congress members can be invited to participate
- CEO is responsible for day-to-day management of ACS
- GC may provide instructions or specific delegations to the CEO from time to time re **strategy and policy**

Congress (cl. 10)

- Congress Responsibilities:
 - Election and if necessary Removal of GC members
 - Election of Panel (Board) Chairs
 - · Monitoring of the behaviour of GC
 - Representation of the interests of members to GC
 - Advisory vote on GC's 'major proposals'
- Congress Reps are elected by Branch Committees
- Chair is elected from Congress by Congress
- Joint GC and Congress membership is precluded
- Size of Congress (8x2 = 16; or 18; possibly +3)
- Wide Eligibility
- GC Chair participates in Congress, but does not vote
- GC members can be invited to observe / participate

Effective Accountability (cl. 12)

- Express Requirements of GC Members:
 - Decisions consistent with ACS Nature and Values (cls. 12.1-12.2, by reference to cl. 1)
 - Transparency, Member Engagement (cls. 12.3-12.4 and 12.7)
- Branch Committee Communication of Dissatisfaction (cl. 12.5, facilitating early warning of discontent)
- Congress Power to Remove GC Members for 'behaviour materially inconsistent with duties' (cl. 12.6)
- Membership Approval for changes to some By-Laws (cl. 12.8, Schedule A)
- Congress Plebiscite on Major Decisions (cl.12.4(b))

Congress as the CRWG – the 5 tricky clauses

Model the CRWG process:

- Robust, courteous and respectful discussion
- Via Chat or Raised Hand to discuss

Outcome:

- Discussion exhausted ready to vote (and abide by the result)
- Need further time scheduled to resolve best option (parked as unresolved)

Each topic presents possible choice option:

- Members of the CRWG will present alternatives
- Discussion, but time limited on each clause
- · Briefing paper informs discussion
- Outcome then decided

The 5 topics

 - Raised by members but not in constitution

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How Many Members of Congress?

cl.10.3(a)(iii) - Briefing Paper p.2

- (a) Election of Members
- (iii) Each Branch Committee elects 2 Congress Reps.

<u>OR</u>

- (iii) Each Branch Committee elects 2 Congress Reps, unless, at the date prescribed in the By-Laws, the Branch has in excess of 20% of the Professional Division members, in which case it elects instead 3 such Representatives.
- Congress of 16 or 18 enough for depth and diversity?
- Access to Larger Talent Pool in the large States
- Reduced air-time per member, large-Branch influence

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How Many Members of Congress?

cl.10.3(a)(iii) - Briefing Paper p.2

Possibly Append:

... together with the Chairs of the Constitutional Standing Committees referred to in cl.9(b).

[The 3 existing Boards: Professional Standards, Membership and Communities, whose 'Directors' the constitution re-titles as 'Chairs', and who are elected by Congress.]

FOR: A Congress of 19 or 21

Continues the present arrangement
Deeper experience, broader diversity

ANTI: Less air-time per member of Congress

Direct member representation 100% down to 84-86%

How Many Members of Governing Committee?

cl.11.3(a)(iii) - Briefing Paper p.3

(a) Number

(i) The number of members of GC is to be $\{9, 11 \text{ or } 12\}$

(1) 9 members (3 elected p.a.)

FOR: More air-time per member

3 vacancies in each year of the 3-year electoral cycle

ANTI: Too few members to contribute time and ensure diversity

(2) 11 members (3, 4, 4 elected in each year of a 3-year

cycle)

FOR: More contributors

ANTI: Less air-time per member

Varying number of vacancies

(3) 12 members (4 elected p.a.)

FOR: Most contributors

4 vacancies in each year of the 3-year electoral cycle

ANTI: Least air-time per member

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By-Laws Subject to Member Approval

Schedule A and cls.7(b), 12.8 - Briefing Paper pp. 4-5

The following documents are subject to Member Approval:

- Code of Ethics National Regulations (NR) 4
- Membership Grades NR 2.1, 2.5
- Qualifications for Admission to the Professional Grades NR 2.2
- Terms of Reference of the Professional Standards Organ

Congress members may also wish to consider the following:

- Principles for Determining how Surplus from the Society's Operations is to be Allocated and/or Investment Policy
- Terms of Reference for Branches, Branch C'tee NR 7 and 8

POSSIBLE CHOICES FOR CONGRESS:

- Agree all
- (2) Move some from Schedule A to Schedule B
- Move some from Schedule B to Schedule A

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The CEO and Governing Committee

cl.13.5 - Briefing Paper pp. 6, 7-9, 10, 12-17

- The CEO is a participant in GC Meetings, with the right to speak and be heard on all items
- Under cl.13.5, the CEO is not a member of any ACS Ctees

POSSIBLE CHOICES FOR CONGRESS:

- A Voting Member of the Governing Committee
- A Non-Voting Member of the Governing Committee (2)
- Not a Member of the Governing Committee

2.1 Membership Grades

Further Recommendations on Annex p.3, and Briefing Paper p.11

Professional Grades

- Entry Grade, for ICT graduates and equivalent
- **Practitioner** Grade, for 'all-but-CP', to break the log-jam
- Public clarity about the Society's Scope

Non-Professional Grades

- Differentiate / Stratify the 'Associate' Grade:
 - Executive Associate for senior managers, CIOs and such
 - Companion for highly-skilled users, lawyers, med, ...
 - Associate for Users, 'gifted amateurs', Secondary School

The CRWG recommends referral of this matter to the Professional Standards Board.

Almost the End

The next phase of work:

Some matters need to be referred to other bodies:

- Code of Professional Conduct
- Professional Grades
- The Logjam at the Transition from AACS to MACS
- Non-Professional Grades

Some By-Laws need revision before changeover

- Updated to reflect new constitution
- · Conflicts and inconsistencies need to be resolved
- Drafting needs improving

Responsibility needs to be assigned and resourced

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Conclusion

Congress has a Recommended Constitution

- Strongly-supported by consultation participants
- Checked for practicality of expressions
- · Reflects three rounds of legal review

Caveat

- MC's decisions re form of incorporation & charity status
- CRWG has prepared contingencies for decision either way
- By-Laws must be adjusted to reflect provisions in new constitution
